Future Projects

Book: "Art, Statelessness and Resistance in Iraqi Kurdistan"

Pluto Press (London), has invited us to submit a book proposal that will be part of a new Global South Book Series. The book is provisionally titled "Art, Statelessness and Resistance in Iraqi Kurdistan".

The field of visual arts constitutes a particularly charged space in Kurdish society. This book will present an ethnographic account that attends to the particulars of individual activist-artists, and their everyday lives, in terms of powers and strategies utilized by these artists to navigate and resist increasingly narrow political and cultural conceptions of Kurdishness and to those contests and arguments that are present in these everyday negotiations. This work will further explore the linkages between stateless peoples and cultural production, specifically, the representation of cultural identities, the institutions, practices and materialities, that resist, subvert and challenge domination, non-recognition, and erasure of a peoples' social histories through discursive and material practices.
